

- The country home to seven UNESCO-designated World Heritage sites
 - On average, only an inch of rain falls in this country per year.
- This country has the largest Arabic population in the world.
 - The country is ethnically homogeneous, comprising more than 99% of the population
 - Social media accounts with more than 5,000 followers are subject to the country's media laws and can be monitored by authorities and must be licensed by the government



- The largest living lizard is native to this country.

 The monitor lizard can grow as long as 7 feet
 - A nuclear family in this country is rare because most people live in large extended families.
- Approximately 10% of the world's bird species live in this country
 - More than 1,500 species of orchids grow wild in this country's forests
 - This country is home to the world's largest gold Buddha, the largest crocodile farm, the largest restaurant, the longest single-span suspension bridge, and the world's tallest hotel.





- Raw meat is considered a delicacy in this country
 - Founded in 980 B.C., this country is one of the oldest nations in the world.
- This country views having twins as a sign of bad luck. They believe that twins may be cursed or invite evil spirits.
 - Almost two-thirds of people in this country live on less than US\$1 a day
 - Parents and children do not share a last name. Most children take their father's first name as their last name.





- The sun does not set in this country from May 25th to July 25th
 - The Vikings discovered this country in the loth century
- The name of this country means "Land of People."
 - Almost 80 percent of the land mass is covered by an ice cap and glaciers.
 - This country was a Danish colony until 1953, when it became a country. It attained home rule in 1979 and began full self-government in 2009





- Until 2011, an import ban in the country meant that the only cars found on the roads were classic cars from pre-1959
 - The smallest bird in the world can be found in this country. It is the Bee Hummingbird, which only grows to be 2 inches in length.
- Until 2008, people in this country were not allowed to own cell phones.
 - On New Year's Eve, people burn dolls in order to symbolize forgetting bad times and looking forward to new and good.
 - Christmas was not an official holiday until







- The only landlocked country in the whole of Southeast Asia
- This country is the most bombed place in the world
- People in this country consume more sticky rice than anyone else in the world
 - Previously under French rule, this country gained full independence in 1954.
- Their main exports wood products, electricity, coffee, tin, gold, copper and garments





- It is impolite to simply say, "Hi." When greeting a a native to this country, it is customary to ask, "How are you?"
 - People from this country refer to foreigners as "mzungu."
- Grasshoppers that have been pan fried are a delicacy
 - This country gained its independence from Britain in 1962.
 - There are an estimated 52 tribes residing in this country.
