#### Personal Development: Building Skills for the Future

At the Lower Academy, we are committed to helping students develop the skills and confidence they need to thrive - not just in school, but in life. Through our Personal Development programme, we offer a range of experiences to support their journey, from career exploration to essential life skills.

Before half term, students took part in National Apprenticeship Week, engaging in activities that introduced them to a variety of pathways, including apprenticeships, T Levels, and A Levels. They also had the opportunity to connect with training providers: one delivered a virtual session, while TCHC visited Year 9 students in person. These experiences broaden students' understanding of their options and encourage them to start thinking about their future with confidence.

To further support this, students are continuing to build key employability skills through Skills Builder, developing competencies such as teamwork, problem-solving, and communication. These qualities are vital for success, whatever path they choose. Parents can help reinforce this at home by encouraging their children to recognise how these skills apply in everyday situations.



Students also have access to Unifrog, a fantastic online platform where they can explore careers, courses, and apprenticeships. We are currently looking into ways for parents and carers to access this resource; in the meantime, we encourage you to ask your child about what they've been exploring on the platform. These conversations can be a great way to spark ambition and set goals for the future.

By working together, students, parents/carers, and staff, we can ensure every young person leaves the Lower Academy prepared, inspired, and ready to take their next steps with confidence.

The visit was a fantastic opportunity for students to showcase their hard work and inspire further support for their ecofriendly initiatives.




### **Building Futures: Year 9 Students Learn About Vocational Opportunities**


#### Year 9 Students Explore NHS Careers in Interactive Workshops

Year 9 students recently took part in insightful NHS Careers Workshops led by Kate Evans from the Health & Care Academy. The sessions introduced students to the vast range of career opportunities within the healthcare sector; from frontline patient care roles, including nurses and paramedics to vital behind-the-scenes positions like digital communication officers and administrative staff.

Throughout the workshops, students gained a deeper understanding of the skills and attributes essential for success in these careers. Kate highlighted the importance of transferable skills, many of which students are already developing, including teamwork, organisation, and creative problem-solving—all key qualities for thriving in the workplace.

A major focus of the sessions was the importance of communication across different healthcare roles. Students even had the chance to learn basic sign language, practicing how to introduce themselves—a valuable skill in patient care and professional settings.

To put their communication skills to the test, students participated in an interactive listening and instruction challenge. One student was given a visual aid, while their partner, unable to see it, had to recreate the object using only verbal instructions. Using playdough to shape their creations, students quickly realised the importance of clear, precise communication.



The sessions provided a valuable insight into the world of healthcare, inspiring our students to consider future careers in this essential industry.




## **Absence Procedures**

To report a student absence please visit the <u>Contact Us</u> page via the Basildon Lower Academy website and select the option for Attendance.

- Parents/carers must contact the school by 8.30am each day their child is absent.

- Parent/carers may be asked for medical evidence to support absences after 3 days or reoccurring absence patterns.
- Wherever possible, parents/carers should make appointments outside of school hours. If this is unavoidable students should attend school before and after the appointment.


